Gospel: Matthew 18:15-20 If Your Brother Sins Against You

¹⁵ "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault, between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have gained your brother. ¹⁶ But if he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, that every charge may be established by the evidence of two or three witnesses. ¹⁷ If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church. And if he refuses to listen even to the church, let him be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector. ¹⁸ Truly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound

in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. ¹⁹ Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. ²⁰ For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them."

As we listen to the words of Jesus in this challenging gospel reading or read them on our screens at home from the electronic service sheet provided, about settling our differences and mending fences, our minds may wander to relationships that have gone wrong and turned sour in our own group of acquaintances. All of us are vulnerable, the strong as well as the weak. Maybe we are feeling the hurt and pain of a close friendship in tatters due to angry words or a betrayal. While we are left nursing our grievances, we forget what made us friends in the first place and precious memories of happy days are replaced by bitter thoughts of what caused the breakup. The sad reality in life is that most of our quarrels and conflicts are not with business institutions or church but with people with whom we come into contact with on a regular basis. While a stranger can bruise us a friend can break us. Relationships are never free from disagreements but sadly some of us need to go no further than our own immediate family to experience the havoc created by rows over the contents of a parent's Will, a strip of land or a boundary fence. I heard a saying once from the late Sir Terry Wogan rather than the well known saying, "Where's there's a will there's a way", Terry often quoted "Where's there a Will there's a family at war"! Sometimes, for good measure, children are drawn into the equation or, failing that, innocent mutual friends, as a test of their allegiance. Where there was once an atmosphere of friendship, joy and good cheer, there is now tension, coolness and a frosty silence. All of us know people whose lives have stopped growing because they focused their energy on something that someone did to them five, ten or twenty years ago.

This Gospel reading set for today from Matthew about conflict resolution is stressing the importance of compromise, of learning to give a little and to develop a sense of proportion and moderation in all things. It is telling us that rows and misunderstandings do take place and always will. We should do everything in our power to avoid such disagreements but when they do happen, how we handle them is most important. A little honest talking about how we feel wronged often clears the air before too much damage is done. With a bit of luck and good grace, we should manage to get ourselves out of most neighbourly disputes which might otherwise escalate into some unbearable minefield. In the cool light of day, a boundary line may not be worth disputing about with bitterness and acrimony. But if you are in the thick of things and family or personal honour is at stake, the whole issue becomes of immense significance and it is so easy to let slip the dogs of war.

When we are feeling hurt and upset it is most important to share our feelings with a faithful friend who will recognise the sacredness of the confidence being placed in them. Their offer of help and guidance with our problem should

encourage us to handle the situation with Christian dignity. Experience teaches that keeping a dignified silence about what has happened is preferable to airing the matter in public, as the latter course of action leads to gossip which can cause more damage than the original fault.

This Gospel reading ends by giving us the assurance that, where-ever we are gathered together as a community rooted in prayer, Jesus Christ is present in our midst. For where ever two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them. In an age when religion has become increasingly privatised, God calls us in communion with him and one another.

I am a great believer in prayer. Prayer can change us, bringing about reconciliation by making us more aware and sensitive to the needs of others. In troubled times, when we pray for peace with others, we raise our consciousness to our Christian calling as peace makers in our parishes, our homes and in our personal relationships.

Allow me to finish with a prayer:

Heavenly Father, help us to lead truly Christian lives. May we imitate your goodness and be sensitive to one another's needs.

We make this prayer and all our prayers in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.....Amen
