

The Son of God, by Jeffrey Archer

He was born in a barn, his father a carpenter, and his mother a decent woman, but they were of no significance, and certainly couldn't have afforded to give the boy a private education. And yet as a teenager, he was arguing the toss with his elders and betters in the council chambers.

He never got a proper job, just roamed around the countryside, unshaven, and living on bread and water and the occasional fish, while offering his opinions to those who cared to listen. He became the manager of a football team known as The Disciples, not one of them a star, in fact the twelfth man rather let the side down by accepting a transfer fee of thirty pieces of silver to play for the opposition. The authorities eventually arrested him as a rabble-rouser. but couldn't decide what to charge him with, other that the fact he claimed he was the Son of God.

They strung him up with a couple of criminals, and when he finally gave up the ghost, rather assumed that would be the last they'd hear of him.

The Disciples were relegated at the end of the season, in fact the captain claimed on more that one occasion that he'd never been a member of His team.

When He died at the age of thirty -three, there were no obituaries in the local press reporting his achievements, no glossy supplements highlighting his colourful career, no radio programmes to discuss his legacy, and no box sets recording any of his miracles.

But then, He'd never relied on focus groups to advise him on current trends, or advertising gurus to spend millions promoting his brand, or spin doctors to sharpen his image, and he didn't require social media to keep his followers up to date, so you could be forgiven for assuming he'd be forgotten in a few days.

So how can you explain that over two thousand years later, Jesus Christ is still the best known celebrity on earth? Could it just be that He was the Son of God?

A Song is Born

In 1961 at the tender age of 21 I had already been in the Royal Air Force for six years. I had been fortunate enough to be presented with a Commendation for some repair work I had done on the first of the UK's 'V' Bombers, The Valiant. The award appeared (very low down) in the New Year's List! Later that year the RAF, in its infinite wisdom, decided that I should be posted overseas. The RAF gave you three months' notice of your impending departure. This was to allow you to put your affairs in order: ie getting married, dumping the girl friend, selling car or motorbike etc. I opted to sell my car as none of the other options applied!

Again the RAF considered your welfare and asked you to choose three preferred postings. Having only travelled to South Wales (for basic RAF training) I thought I should take advantage of the offer and duly applied for 1) Hong Kong, 2) Singapore and 3) Cyprus. It seemed an ideal way to get my knees brown but in February 1962 I found myself on a very cold airfield in northwest Western Germany,

close to the Dutch border. The 'wisdom' of the RAF's thinking soon dawned on me when I was told that I would be repairing badly damaged aircraft at No. 420 Maintenance Unit. This was quite varied and I carried out major repairs to Canberras, Javelins, Hunters and helicopters of the RAF and Army Air Corps.

Attached to our unit there was a German civilian workshop with lathes, planers, milling and boring machines, all of which produced parts that could not readily be supplied from aircraft manufacturing stocks. They also made one-off specialist tools to our particular requirements, for example extended screwdrivers and spanners bent into unusual shapes.

The Germans were not allowed to work on the aircraft but could be shown what was required. One young engineer called Hans took a shine to me and asked me to help him with his English as he wanted to come and work in the UK. Although we had very little social contact, at lunch and tea breaks we would converse and he would make notes. When my two and a half year stint was complete I was posted back to RAF Lyneham, near Swindon. Hans asked to keep in

ELECTORAL ROLL

Under the Church Representation Rules a new Electoral Roll must be prepared every six years. Everyone who wishes to have their name included on the new Roll, whether their name is on the present Roll or not must fill in a new application form. The forms are available in church or from the Church office and must be completed and returned to me or the Church Office by Sunday 10th March so that the new Roll can be published three weeks before the APCM which is to be held on 3rd April 2019.

Membership of the Electoral Roll entitles you to vote at the APCM or stand for election to the PCC. You are entitled to have your name entered on the roll if:

- You are baptised and aged 16 or over
- You have signed a form of application for enrolment and either
- are a member of the Church of England or of any Church in communion with the C of E and are resident in the parish or (not being resident in the parish) have attended public worship in the parish for at least six months.
- Are a member in good standing of a Church (not in communion with the C of E) which subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity

Any error discovered in the roll should be reported to the Electoral Roll Officer

CHURCH ARCHITECTURE CHAPTER THREE

Dear Readers, it seems some time ago that I last wrote to you. But you may remember my composition on Gothic architecture and an explanation describing "Flying Buttresses" An amazing co-incidence, Ann and I visited Exeter Cathedral shortly after my article and attended a presentation on its history and architecture given by a lady whose name eludes me but was excellent. She commenced by saying I must tell you something about Flying Buttresses and proceeded to explain Gothic architecture. She must have read my script! Moving on, the subject of this treatise is Romanesque architecture. Romanesque architecture is massive, low, and solid-looking. Round Roman arches, thick walls, and small windows are typical of the buildings. How different from Gothic style with pointed arches. So Readers you ask "where can

I see a good example of

Romanesque architecture?

The answer is on our doorstep, Gloucester Cathedral, see the image on facing page.
Much of this Romanesque
Cathedral has survived including the entire crypt, much of the east end, the great nave piers most of the north aisle and the Chapter House.

So where did it all begin? Let us stick with our Gloucester Cathedral. The Romanesque style was brought from the Continent by William the Conqueror and his followers. The rounded arches were used by the ancient Romans and became popular throughout Europe during the 11th Century. Gloucester Cathedral was begun by Abbot Serlo in 1089. The quire and transepts were completed by 1100 just four vears before the Abbots death in 1104. The Nave was completed several years later. You will remember that Gothic architecture became the accepted style in France in the early 12th Century and then became the preferred style throughout the UK. I intended to tell you something

This year, the World Day of Prayer, (formerly the Women's World Day of Prayer,) will be held in St Patrick's Church Hall at 10am on Friday 1st March.





THE QUEEN MOTHER'S FAVOURITE CAKE.

This recipe has been doing the rounds since the 1940's and was originally baked and sold in churches along with this note: 'This was reputed to be the favourite cake of the late Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother. At her request, the recipe must not be given away but sold for 5p and the money donated to a charitable organisation' so if you would like to donate something to St. George's church or to Mothers' Union, please do!

METHOD:

baking tin.

INGREDIEN 13.	IVIE I NOD:
170g dates	 Preheat oven to 180C/gas mark 4. Pour half a pint of boiling water over 170g of dates and 1tsp of bicarbonate of soda. Allow to stand while the following ingredients are mixed: sugar, butter, egg, vanilla essence, sifted flour, baking powder, salt and chopped walnuts. Add those ingredients to the date mixture.
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda	
170g sugar	
60g butter	
1 beaten egg	
1tsp vanilla essence	
170g sifted plain flour	
1tsp baking powder	
½ tsp salt	
5tbsp full fat milk*	
85g channed walnute	5. Place mixture in a 30 x 23cm

For the topping:

85g chopped walnuts

INCREDIENTS:

Boil together 5 tbsp of brown sugar with 2 tbsp of full fat milk* for three minutes.

Spread mixture on the cake and sprinkle with finely chopped walnuts.

(The recipe suggests using "top of the milk". Those of us older members of the congregation will remember the milk of our childhood being delivered to our doors and having a layer of cream at the top of the bottle! When I was young my sister and brother and myself used to see who could get to the bottle first to get the "top of the milk"!!!)


History of Brockworth Court


Tim Wiltshire has kindly given us a number of beautifully illustrated little booklets entitled: Brockworth Court. The Living History of a Medieval Manor House.


