Reading: Matthew 28:16-20 - The Commissioning of the Disciples

Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

A message from Gordon Clifford...

Today is Trinity Sunday and it is an occasion within the Christian Year which invites us to think about the very nature of God himself – as Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

God has revealed us to himself in three ways. There are not three separate Gods. Rather God is like the stem of the plant which has revealed his glory by producing three leaves. Each leaf has its own identity but draws its life and strength from the stem.

Today I invite you to join with me in reflecting upon the threefold nature of God by considering some of the attributes of the Holy Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And for ease of memory, each begins with the letter "**P**".

For the first attribute, we may liken God the Father to the Producer. He has produced all that is. He has brought everything into being.

Firstly, he planned it. Then he produced it. He is like a master craftsman who has constructed the world. Each and every piece of it has been fashioned by him. He conceived the ideas. He planned them. Then he produced the finished articles. He is Father of all. He is productive.

He brought the worlds to birth and launched the stars into space. His mind conceived the galaxies and his hands formed the earth.

Yet God did more than just produce the world. He did not create it and then left it lifeless, rigid, as a collection of artefacts or as an assembly of finished products waiting upon a shelf for a customer who never comes.

For besides being a planner and producer, God has acted as a Father. He produced not a series of snapshots, but he made a movie! He produced a world of life and movement. His production is not static, but is alive with life.

Besides being a producer, the Father is a poet and he has brought beauty and rhythm. His handiwork is expressive and points to truth beyond what is made. Just as a pot may tell us something about the potter, and just as a poem may speak at more than one level, so the creation of the world points to the fatherhood of its producer. So the heavens themselves declare the glory of God

He is the one who made all, who watches over his handiwork, who cherishes his production and who loves his world.

For the second attribute, we may liken God to our Pattern for living.

God the Father loves his world. When he saw that the world was in great need, he sent his own Son into the world to show us the way of God and to lead us back to the Father's fold.

Jesus Christ came as the Son of God. He came to show us God. "He who has seen me has seen the Father" he said to Philip (John c14 v9b)

That did not mean Jesus was a physical resemblance of God the father. What it did mean was that Jesus had come to represent God to the people. God was with him and God was in him. He came

to do the Father's will, and when and where the will of God is done then God is near. Jesus did the will of God and showed the fullest measure of God's purpose that men and women have ever seen. His was a life willing both to minister to individuals on a personal level and to challenge the systems which perpetuated their condition. Such is God's way. Jesus showed it. He calls us to follow him because he is the Way. In other words, Jesus is our Pattern.

If we imitate him then we will live in God's way. If we place our feet in the marks of his footsteps, then we will be walking along the path of life. Jesus came to show us the ways of God and the way to God. He came as our guide and our pattern for living.

For the third attribute of God we may liken him to Power.

The Holy Spirit came to his disciples on the Day of Pentecost which we celebrated last Sunday (May 31st). He came to empower them. The Holy Spirit is God's power given to rest upon his people, to abide with them and to be their strength.

The Holy Spirit came to Peter, James and John, and to the others, and galvanised them ready for action. Where as they were weak, now they became strong. Where as they had felt inadequate, now they became confident. Where as they had been nervous, now they became bold. Where as they had been apprehensive, now their fear turned into brave people who became bearers of the good news. In the power of the Holy Spirit they proclaimed the Gospel. They preached of the purposes of God, of the death and resurrection of Jesus, and of the coming of the Holy Spirit. And they called for people to respond by repenting of their sin, by accepting the Gospel and by belonging to the company of those who believed.

Their work was powerful and persuasive. People heard their message and the responded positively to it. The church came into being – and has remained so ever since.

God has power to changes people's lives for the better. He has the power to overcome evil and to replace it with goodness. He has power to overcome hatred and to replace it with love. He has power to defeat enmity and to replace it with brotherly concord and sisterly affection. He has power to overcome anger and rage, and to replace them with patience and goodwill.

God has the power to change lives for the better through the message of the Gospel. He has the power to transform people and society. He accomplishes this through the working of the Holy Spirit in the lives of all who are open to him and are receptive of him.

God is not impotent but powerful to bring change, powerful to bring renewal, powerful to bring people into a new life, powerful to bring his purposes to birth and to fruition. The Holy Spirit is the power of God at work in the church and in the world.

God has planned the world and brought everything, including us, into being.

He is our producer who watches over us as a father. His Son came to show us the way. Jesus Christ is the One for us to imitate. He is the pattern for our living. The mission given to us all by Jesus is to become sensitive to the world around us, to the love of God which is our inheritance, by developing lives of loving relationships within our local community. We bring that message of love where it is needed most by being a rainbow of hope to someone who is downhearted, lonely, suffering from depression or Covid-19.

The love of God also shines when we share what we have with the needy or set time aside to listen to the concerns of our children. The Trinity is a celebration of the love of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit who are so closely bonded to each other that they become perfectly one, while remaining distinct persons. Human love is a mirror of such love.

The Holy Spirit came to enliven and invigorate, to inspire and to uplift his people. He is God's power at work in the world.

Producer, **P**attern and **P**ower. They are not in opposition, but in harmony. They belong together and are held together. They are bound in a unity of love and fellowship.

Producer, **P**attern and **P**ower – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – one God to be blessed and adored for ever and ever. Amen.
