A Christian response to Brexit A message from Bishop Rachel and Bishop Robert

Our Diocesan LIFE vision through its 'Engagement' strand commits us to being advocates for human flourishing, but there can be no doubt that amid the ongoing turbulence and uncertainty regarding the UK's withdrawal from the European Union, many faced with such great challenges and seemingly impossible questions, are struggling to know what they can do.

Yet as followers of Christ we are not helpless and we want to thank you for the different ways in which you are living out Christ's love and hope during these days of extraordinary political unknowns, not least amid people's anxiety and frustration. Thank you for praying and living 'good neighbourliness'.

Jesus told his disciples a parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree. so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches." (Matthew 13:31-32) Jesus speaks of something good and small being planted which grows into something life-giving, generous and hospitable. It is a beautiful picture of the inclusive Kingdom of God. We are all invited to join in and we each have small seeds to plant. We want to encourage you not only

to be planting and tending in the

relationships of everyday life, but also to consider if there are ways you can bring diverse people together in your local contexts to identify shared hopes about the sort of communities we want to be.

First there are all the opportunities we have as individual members of the body of Christ to be good neighbours amid the people and places of our everyday lives. The recent letter from the Diocese of Oxford is extremely helpful in offering some practical pointers and directing people to further resources. We commend the letter to you here.

Second our worshipping communities can be key in creating spaces for conversation, not least because we often have suitable buildings where people can gather, but also because we host many community events and activities which can be used to shape specific conversations. There are resources including conversation starters such as 'what are the three main things we have in common that we can build on for a better future as a community?' available at www.churchofengland.org/together. Such conversations are not about apportioning blame or directing shoulds and oughts at decisionmakers, but rather firing imaginations to look at common ground and what people might like to participate in together.

As was said when we wrote in January 'Wishing that things had been lived differently will not change where we are, but we can be involved in shaping the present and future.' This comes with our ongoing thanks and prayers

Rise, take your mat and walk

Women, men and children of all ages are called to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' to join this day of prayer.* Women of Zimbabwe have prepared this year's service and they encourage us all to reflect on the difficulties and unrest that have plagued their country over many years. They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future. They encourage us to 'Rise, take your mat and walk' with them as they continue their often turbulent journey towards full reconciliation.

World Day of Prayer is an international inter-church organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on Friday 6 March 2020, people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Zimbabwe.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 170 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world --- through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas - before finishing in American Samoa more than 36 hours later.

Biblical cities – Chapter 6, Antioch (Antakya)

Dear Readers, you will recall my past series on Biblical Cities. Sadly. those I chose were war torn cities in the Middle East. I promised you for Chapter six a more stable city, why not Antioch (historically Antakya)? This city was located about 15 miles inland from the Mediterranean Sea. in what today is Turkey, just north of Syria. Antioch on the Orontes was an ancient Greek city on the eastern side of the Orontes River. Its ruins lie near the modern city of Antakya. Antioch is so important to Christians because it became home to the first Christian church outside of the land of Israel and was the first place in which followers of Jesus were referred to as Christians. The population was composed of Greeks from Athens and Macedonia and a sizeable Jewish population. You ask, "Is it safe?" Yes, it is very safe; not a single tourist has ever been a victim of a terrorist attack in spite of its proximity to the Syrian border.

Unlike Damascus, which, you will remember, has 58 references in the Bible. Antioch has only 14 in the New Testament and none in the Old Testament - 13 in the Acts of the Apostles and one in Galations.

But let us go to the most important Chapter, that is Acts Chapter 11. When Stephen was killed and martyred in Jerusalem, Christian believers were scattered because of persecution to many cities, among them Antioch. Here, believers proclaimed the Good News about the Lord to Gentiles. During this time the Jews were regarded as a favoured people and many thought that salvation was only meant for them. It was an uphill struggle for Gentiles, however news reached the church in Jerusalem and it was here that Barnabas decided to go to Antioch. Here he urged the people to be faithful and turn to the Lord. And he got many converts. Then he went to Tarsus to look for Saul (his Jewish name) who became Paul and Barnabas took him to Antioch for a whole year and it was here that believers were first called Christians as they severed themselves from the synagogue some 20 vears after Christ's death. The city then became the headquarters of the missionary Paul about 47-55CE It is interesting to record that in Paul's travels to different countries he wrote letters which comprise a large part of the New Testament, to the Corinthians. to the Hebrews and the Ephesians etc but not to his own city where he spent much of his life. Could letters have been lost? No-one knows.

More and more people on benefits are moving onto Universal Credit. None of them should need a food bank. But from the very start, everyone who applies has to wait at least five weeks for a first payment – some people are left waiting longer. This is leaving many without enough money to cover the basics.

The Trust is campaigning for the five week wait to end. They have wide support in this, including from The Childrens' Society who say "We know that problems with the benefit system, including the five-week wait, is one of the main reasons that families fall into financial crisis. The long wait for an initial Universal Credit payment can leave families without enough money to pay bills or to provide food for their children. We support the #5WeeksTooLong campaign because Universal Credit should support families instead of pushing them towards a financial crisis."

Returning to the bible, most of the references to Antioch concern Paul and Barnabas, their travels to various countries and their return to Antioch. on this mutual conviction Paul Acts 14 records that they preached in confronted Peter when Peter became Derbe and won many disciples and then returned to Antioch via Lystra and Iconium.

Allow me to conclude with the lone reference outside Acts, that of Galatians Chapter two.

This chapter contains a summary of the confrontation between Paul and Peter and later involves. Barnabas and Christians in Jerusalem. Peter says that he came to Antioch to confront Paul because he felt that he was clearly in the wrong. It is considered "one of the most momentous events in the earliest Christianity". Paul details the theological reasons of his dispute with Peter. In verse 17 Paul uses the word 'we'/'our'

to show that both he and Peter actually agreed about the justification by faith only, and based inconsistent.

So what of Antioch today? There have been many archeological excavations exposing mosaic floors. Private and public dwellings remain. These are typical of the Roman period and can be seen in the local museum. The area around Antioch is based mainly on agriculture. The chief crops are wheat, cotton, rice, grapes, olives and fruit. The population is just over 200,000.

For the next issue, how about Rome, for which there are 28 references in the Bible?



Jesus is the Cornerstone of our lives. Jesus is the One who will always be with us, whether the storm roars around us, whether the snow falls, or the sun shines. We can always rely on Him to direct us.

There is a phrase which occurs many times in the Bible. This is it: - "And it came to pass" The horrible things which beset all of us at one time or another do pass. When we are in the storm we so often think that Jesus has deserted us. But He hasn't. Jesus supports us, Jesus walks with us, and Jesus reminds us of this when He says, "I am with you always". How often have you said, "I never thought I would manage to come through that storm which really knocked me sideways". And yet you did, and it was Jesus who helped you.

Amanat worked seven days a week in a brick-kiln. Every day he made 1,000 bricks, which earned him 800 rupees (approximately £4.20; US\$5.30; €4.70). But he never took any money home because every rupee went straight back to the brick-kiln owner to pay interest on a loan Amanat had taken. His situation was so bad that he had to borrow money to buy food for his children.

When Barnabas Fund's partners told Amanat that his debt would be paid, his eyes filled with tears of joy. The impossible had happened. Now his eldest daughter Rebecca is learning tailoring and his younger children are at school. Barnabas supports the school and the tailoring skills' training project.

"My Lord has sent me good news through Barnabas Fund. Now I enjoy freedom from debt!" exclaimed Amanat.

Like thousands of Pakistani Christian brick-kiln workers, Amanat and his wife Rehana had borrowed money from their employer for essential needs at a time of family crisis. The debts keep each family bonded to their brick-kiln, unable to leave and get another job, with money deducted from their wages to pay the interest. It is impossible, out of their poverty, to pay off the debts. Despised, despairing and trapped, the bonded brick-kiln workers feel like slaves. But Barnabas Fund supporters have donated to set free hundreds of families by paying off their debts.

"I rejoice for this miracle in our lives"

"My mouth just does not stop praising God for the blessings and freedom from debt He has given us," says Irfan, another Christian brick -kiln worker whose debt was paid by Barnabas Fund. "We are now hopeful for our future. Now we are working with respect and without fear."

With nothing being deducted from his wages any more, Irfan can set aside money every month to pay for his children's schooling. "God sent you people for our help. We are deeply grateful. I now rejoice for this miracle in our lives."




