The hall is located in the centre of Brockworth village on Court Road, GL3 4ET and has good facilities including a private car park for hall users.


The main hall holds up to 100 people - perfect for larger events, and can be hired for £15 per hour, or £50 for four hours.



On Easter Sunday in Sri Lanka, religious extremists killed more that 250 people in suicide bomb attacks. A week earlier, a pregnant woman and three children were massacred at a baby dedication service in a church in Nigeria. These evil deeds are being carried out in many countries around the world. In Myanmar (formerly Burma) many Christians suffer life-changing injuries. Two men who left their camp to search for food in the forest, were severely injured and one had to have both legs amputated. In countries around the world about 3.000 Christians a year are murdered for their faith. Please pray for the work that Barnabas Charity workers are doing to help persecuted Christians. We have so little idea of the suffering many Christians are subjected to, - so pray, and pray again.

Vacancy—what happens next?

At that point, the Profile will be placed on our St. George's website, so do have a look. The PCC also approved the three representatives who will work with the Archdeacon and Area Dean in the shortlisting process and also with the Bishop for the interviews, due to take place in October.

North Korean believers say they are "very encouraged by radio messages" from Open Doors supporters, broadcast to them over the radio.

Open Doors broadcasts several Christian programmes to North Koreans each week, all in the middle of the night because it's the safest time for them to listen to the radio. Kast year, many Christians sent in messages of encouragement that could be shared with North Korean believers, and many sent in prayers and verses to strengthen their North Korean family.

One church leader said "I remember that after the song "The love of God" was broadcast, a message from a foreign believer was read out. It quoted Colossians 1: 1-8, where Paul talks about thanking and praying always."

The message said that the lives of North Korean believers match those from Colossians 1.

BIBLICAL CITIES, CHAPTER THREE -----JERICHO

Dear Readers, what comes to mind if I asked you what you know about Jericho? Well, I guess many of you will say the well known African American spiritual hymn "Joshua fought (often fit) the battle of Jericho and the walls came tumbling down" The Composer of this spiritual is unknown but believed to be slaves in the first half of the 19th Century. It has been recorded by many famous people including, Elvis Presley, Bing Crosby, Paul Robeson and Mahalia Jackson to name but a few. So what is it all about? Well, we have to open our bibles in the book of Joshua Chapter 6 verses 15 to 21. Joshua, the son of Nun, was the King of Jericho. The walls of Jericho fell after the Israelites marched around the city blowing their trumpets in celebration after conquering Canaan

Excavations have revealed that Jericho is one of the earliest settlements dating back to 9000 BCE. It also has the oldest known protective wall in the world. Continuing excavations have revealed stone towers which are even older. The reason for its early settlements are the springs which are found in and near the

city. These springs supply the area with enough water to sustain a large population. Back to the Bible, it may surprise you to know that there are 58 verses in the bible that mention Jericho. But only 6 of these are in the New Testament so I thought that I would dwell on these. The first reference is in Matthew chapter 20. I quote". And as they departed from Jericho, a great multitude followed him" It was here that he met the two blind men. Now we move onto Marks Gospel Chapter 10 and again I quote "And they came to Jericho and as he went out of Jericho with his disciples and a great number of people" It was here that he met blind Bartimaeus begging. Luke Chapter 10 tells the story of the Good Samaritan with which I am sure that we are all familiar. This happened to a man who travelled from Jerusalem to Jericho when he fell among thieves. There are two more references in Luke repeating the Matthew events. Finally, the last reference is in Paul's Epistle to the Hebrews Chapter 11 verse 30, quote: "By faith the walls of Jericho fell down, after they were compassed about seven days" In conclusion Jericho, unlike many biblical cities, is not in ruins. It is a city located in the West Bank. Jericho is one of the fourteen earliest

Now she knows the place and she is quite happy. She sits outside on the patio and talks to people as they walk by. Nine German E boats stumbled upon them in the dark destroying two landing craft loaded with gasoline, explosives and hundreds of men on board. Officially 749 men died. Watching the D-Day commemoration on the TV, I thought of Slapton Sands and wondered how many more people do we have to thank for our freedom today. This year I will say a little prayer when we get to the tank and give thanks.



Jericho is Relations", signed on 29 April located 258 metres (846 ft) below sea level in an oasis in Wadi Qelt in the Jordan Valley, which makes it the lowest city in the world..

So, dear Readers what do we know of Jericho today? Jericho has been occupied by Israel since the Six-Day War of 1967 along with the rest of the West Bank. It was the first city handed over

to Palestinian Authority control in accordance with the Oslo Accords. The limited Palestinian self-rule of Jericho was agreed on in the Gaza–Jericho Agreement of 4 May 1994. Part of the agreement was a "Protocol on Economic 1994.

It is a very popular tourist city with Palestinians but not with Europeans. There we have it Readers, the next issue will be on Damascus.

Visit to the National Star Centre

Following an interesting talk to the Mother's Union a few months ago. Jean Corless arranged for a group of us to visit the National Star Centre to find out more about their amazing work, for which it has received a number of awards, both national and international. The Star Centre opened in May 1967 in a Manor with a stable block and out buildings bequeathed to them at Ullenwood. Initially there were 10 students from all over the UK but this number grew to 40 in the first year.

The Centre has grown hugely in the intervening years and now supports more than 1000 young people with a wide range of disabilities including cerebral palsy, polio, spina bifida, brain injuries and learning disabilities. Originally housed in shared bedrooms and dormitories, specialist accommodation has been built with hoists, adjustable height fittings and remotely operated switches which give the young people a high degree of independence helping them to cope with their disability. At the Star College students learn a wide range of skills in beautiful

peaceful surroundings, supported by a dedicated staff of therapists and teachers. From the early days they had work placements with local companies and reports verify just how much they are capable of in the world of work.

Many have difficulty in communicating so in recent years the advances in assistive technology to help them communicate has had a huge impact. The wide range of activities that that students benefit from include art and drama, music, the use of a gym, swimming pool and hydrotherapy centre as well as many outdoor activities. They also learn life skills assisting in the shop and restaurant.

After 3 or 4 years at the National Star College (as it was renamed in 1993) some students move into





engagement Israel versus Egypt in Stonehouse



This half term, sports ministry charity PSALMS held its first sports camp in Stonehouse. 18 children aged 7-11 came to play sport and learn more about trust and perseverance through the story of Moses.

Ben Fudge, one of the sports ministers running the day explained how it was set up. "The day started with the children dividing into two countries, Egypt and Israel. They did team chants, made badges and held an opening ceremony. To introduce the theme of trust and perseverance, we watched a video of the Brownlee brothers, the brothers who became famous when older brother Alistair helped his dehydrated younger brother Johnny over the line in the World Triathlon Series race in 2016.

"The PSALMS team got the children involved by doing a role play about Moses and Pharaoh and then it was time to start doing sport. Each sport task used the key values as part of the activity and the 'countries' came together to discuss the value in each break time. The final conversation was around practical applications of the values for the young people's lives— "How can this value be worked out in the situation that I am facing right now?" Camps in general are important for getting kids outside of their comfort zones and getting them to think in a different way. It gives them the space to go a bit deeper in their thinking and ask questions about faith.

"Delivering the day was a team effort—thanks go to The Woolpack for providing free food and Pizza Planet for discounted food, plus Churches Together in Stonehouse for a donation towards costs. 100 per cent of the children said they would like to come again to something similar and 80 per cent were confident that they now understood more about the core values."

Spotlight on The Armoury

The Armoury is a new Christian-run gym, connecting with young men and women with no church background. 85% of the members are ages 18-25. He said: "The Armoury has provided a community where people are not judged on what they look like, how far they can run, what they say but on who they truly are. We value people and progress, over perfection."
